

Telemarks

Open & Closed - Waltz, Foxtrot, Quickstep & Tango

The Telemark, which means "to turn," is a very popular figure in

RDing, and as such is used to change the directional

flow of figures.

The Open Telemark (Telemark to Semi Closed Position) is the most popular and is commenced with the L foot (heel lead) and generally in the diagonal direction facing DC. The M's second step, which is taken on the ball of the R foot, is taken after shaping the body to the left and requires a longer count in Waltz; it is a side step, but still in line with the direction of travel of the first step, the end facing direction is DRC. The second step has a hovering feel about it which relates to the heel turn being done by the W. The third step, which is taken on the toe, and is probably the most critical because it determines the ease of movement into the next group of figures following the Telemark, is taken to the side in a compact SCP. If the step is to the side and slightly forward, right turning figures should follow. If side and slightly back, left turning figures should be used, such as a Telespin, etc.

The W takes her first step back on her R toe using a left face curving action and shaping to the M; she then draws her L heel back to her R and makes a left face heel turn with the majority of her weight remaining on the R foot. W must keep her head in a closed head position as she makes the heel turn. Upon completion of the turn, she turns her head to the right then steps sideward on her R toe to complete the figure. The W's ending footwork position must match the M's for ease of entry into the next figure.

The Open Telemark normally commences facing DC, but can be done from other alignments.

The timing for Waltz (using a hovering action on step 2, is 1,2,AH/3; (Stealing from the 3rd count).

For Foxtrot SQQ; (Or as I prefer SS&;).

For Quickstep SS;S,-, (One and one half measures long).

For Tango QQS;

Closed Telemark (Telemark to Contra Banjo). starting position and first step are the same as the Open Telemark. The second step the same as the Open Telemark except the W rotates further and the M eliminates most of his (Continued next page.)

hovering action. The W also keeps her body turned toward the M and maintains closed head position to match the M throughout the figure. The W's third step is taken side and slightly back in CBJO.

The dance commencing positions and timing remain the same as described in the Open Telemark.

The use of rise and fall in these figures greatly increases their enjoyment.

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
